PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The essence to maintaining interest is to insure that everyone has a job to do and is contributing. This has been a conscious philosophy adopted by the Board.

At this stage a President's Report usually embarks on listing the achievements accomplished throughout the year. I will break from tradition and leave this task to where the credit truly belongs; the Service Committee Chairman. I feel extremely proud and honoured to have been in the President's chair when so much has been achieved.

ROTARY CLUB OF CAMBERWELL Inc. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2000

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

The Rotary Club of Camberwell Inc. carries on operations as a non-profit organisation providing services to the international community. The Club operates several bank accounts, two for conducting the affairs of the Club and the remainder for purposes of its community service.

The accompanying operating statement is in respect of the affairs of the Club. The attached Statements of Receipts and Payments show the transactions in respect of the General Charity Fund and the Art Show Account for the year ended 30 June 1999.

The balances of the accounts and investments operated for the General Charity Fund and the Art Show do not form part of the assets of the Club.

Investments are recorded in the accounts are their cost of acquisition.

2. DISCLOSURE OF BOARD MEMBER'S INTEREST

The Treasurer is an Authorised Representative of a Licensed Securities Dealer in which he has a pecuniary interest. In the course of operations of the Rotary Club of Camberwell Inc., the Club utilises the services of the Licensed Securities Dealer to invest monies. Commissions may be payable to the Licensed Securities Dealer by investment managers or borrowers for arranging these investments.

3. CONTINGENT LIABILITY

The claim made against the Club for injuries incurred by a member's spouse during the 1998 Art Show has been settled by the Club's insurer.

The Committee met on eleven occasions throughout the year and I thank all members for their participation and support. In keeping with our brief, our aim has been to investigate useful and meaningful projects which nurture and encourage our young people and encourage initiatives that provide programs and opportunity for youth, supporting these where they fit our overall goals and Rotary Direction.

In pursuing that aim, our club has continued with its participation in several well-proven programs and involved itself in some new, interesting and very worthwhile projects.

Post Graduate Diploma in Adolescent Health and Welfare

The Centre for Adolescent Health has offered the Graduate Diploma in Adolescent Health and Welfare at Melbourne University since 1996 to assist professionals working with young people to recognise the warning signs of mental ill-health among our adolescent population.

Our club continued its support of this vital program by sponsoring two teachers and two youth workers to attain their Diplomas. We have identified three members of Victoria Police who are to commence the course during the next Rotary year.

Siemens Summer Science Experience

This is a series of three-day programs held during December and January each year for Year 9 students about to enter Year 10. The course is designed to introduce participants to some of the wonders of science and technology, and learn about career opportunities. year our club endorsed seventeen students from local schools to attend, fully sponsoring twelve of these.

National Youth Science Forum (NYSF)

The NYSF assists students moving into Year 12 who wish to follow a career in science by involving them in a dynamic two-week residential forum at the National University in Canberra each January.

Gaining selection to the NYSF is highly prized with only 276 places being available to the thousands of students who apply.

This year both our candidates were chosen to attend. Joanna Patocs, a student at Loreto Mandeville Hall and Jeremy Lee from Camberwell Grammar did themselves and our club proud by their success. Those of us who were fortunate to be at the meeting when these two outstanding young people addressed the club could not help but be impressed with their enthusiasm and their account of the benefits of attending the NYSF.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)

RYLA is a one-week leadership training program, designed to assist young people involved in aspects of youth work by offering a training experience involving educational and recreational activities. This year our club sponsored four young people to attend RYLA. John McLennon, Aaron Mooney, Claire Pratt and Dayna Swiateck spoke to us at a club meeting following their week at RYLA and all spoke glowingly of the benefits derived from attending.

Friday Night School

Undoubtedly, one of the highlights of the year was "discovering" Friday Night School, a prime example of volunteerism at its best. This wonderful initiative, held under the auspices of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, assists disadvantaged immigrant children with their school work. The school is staffed entirely by volunteers, including students from many and varied secondary colleges who give of their time freely and often for many years. In doing so they deliver benefits to needy children and their families and build bridges of inestimable good will.

Our club has contributed some funding and donated used computer equipment for the ongoing operation of the school. Thanks are extended to those club members who donated computers, which will continue as an ongoing need.

Boroondara Clubs "Challenge" Project"

Our club has joined with the Rotary Club of North Balwyn in funding a pilot program to assist "Students at Risk" in the City of Boroondara. The ten week program for Year 9 and 10 students conducted by clinical psychologist Simon Crisp will be evaluated on completion to assess its ongoing viability.

Caitlin Facey

Caitlin is an 8 year old resident of Surrey Hills, whom our club was able to assist in the purchase of a specially modified tricycle which would help her to combat the effects of cerebal palsy. The trike arrived just in time to add some extra joy to Caitlin's Christmas.

As the Rotary year draws to a close there are a number of other matters in train which will be best passed on to the incoming committee for their further assessment. These include an appeal from St. Paul's School to assist the family of a profoundly disabled seven year-old boy; the possible involvement by the club with an early childhood bridging program known as HIPPY (Home Instruction Program for Pre-school Youngsters); reinvolving the club with the Peer Support program; and re-evaluation of our ability to participate in the International Youth Exchange.

REPORT OF THE VOCATIONAL COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 2000 – 2001

This year the Vocational Committee were a motivated and enthusiastic group. They worked tirelessly towards the programs and projects, which they set at the start of the year.

The committee embarked upon new projects, which were challenging and also maintained the clubs past involvement in programs, which have contributed so much to the local community.

Early in the year the Club was addressed by Jane Moglia, who spoke about her life and involvement as an amputee ski instructor for the disabled. Jane had successfully competed and won a bronze medal in New Zealand in 1999.

After hearing her speak the committee agreed to donate 4 pairs of outriggers to be used to teach novice amputee's how to ski. The outriggers valued \$2,648:00 and were presented to the president of the Disabled Winter Sports Victoria on the 8th November.

The club has been encouraged by district to initiate a program Rotarians On Line which provides a workshop on the Internet and e-mail for club members and their partners. The committee through David, Aub and Loreto ran the first program on the 16th November at the Melbourne Girls College in Richmond where a large number of members and partners participated. Feedback from this event and a subsequent questionnaire filled out by members indicated that a second workshop was needed. Time constraints prevented this committee putting this into place, I would commend this program to next years committee.

This year the committee was active in its program of Awards, which recognised and encourage individuals in a broad range of activities.

School Artist Vocational Awards: Ron coordinated and managed the program
that invited twenty one schools and colleges within the city of Borondara to enter
up to 3 works in each class. This is the third year that the awards were presented.
Carrying on from past years this program attracted an increase in the number of

entrees with the winners of the Awards being presented on the Monday 30th April at the Art Show. This year the range of work accepted was extended from strict traditional/realist art to representational art that may be portrayed in an imaginative or creative way. Six schools participated with 23 paintings which was double that of last year. This represented a large increase on the first school that entered in 1999.

The awards increased this year from \$150 to \$200 for Class A winner and from \$250 to \$300 for class B winners. In addition this year a \$400 art supply voucher was awarded to each of the schools where winning students attended. The cost of these prizes was shared between Deans Art and the Clubs vocational Committee.

2. Apprenticeship of the Year Award: This Award is given in recognition of personal achievement and success in academic studies in the awardees chosen vocation. This year Gino managed the program. After the interviews were completed it was recommended that two Awards should be made this year. These being presented on the 6th June to Anthony Lipiccolo(apprentice in plumbing) and Matthew Reynolds(apprentice in plumbing and gas fitting).

3. Shine On' Awards: This years Club candidate for the Shine On' Awards was Jane Moglia. This Australia-wide Rotary Award recognises outstanding service by persons with a disability who disregard their disability in reaching their goals to serve others. Jane was selected by the Vocational Committee for her service to others and was recognised for her work when she was presented with a Certificate of Commendation and was singled out for one of the major prizes presented in Ballarat on the 20th May. Paul acted as club mentor in this program.

4. Young Achiever Award: This Award honours an outstanding young person who has achieved prominence in his or her vocation, and whose humanitarian work in the community exemplifies the Rotary Spirit of "Service above Self". This year's Award was presented to Sarah Jean Kriegler and was presented to her on the 6th June.

A new initiative this year was a work experience program for students in year 6. Gino presented the committee with a written proposal outlining its objectives and aims initiated the project. The principal of the Kew Primary School and club members, who indicated their willingness to act as hosts to some of the students, supported the program. The Committee intended to run a pilot program but was delayed due to lack of adequate insurance, it is hoped that next year the Vocational Committee will be in a position to run this exciting program.

The club participated this year in Operation Live Wire, unfortunately the club candidate failed to complete his submission by the due date. This did not reflect in any way on our club member who acted as his mentor and I thank David Baker for accepting this responsibility and the time and effort he put into supporting the candidate.

Throughout the year a number of club members have presented their Member Behind the Badge talks, these speakers prove the club has within its ranks some great talent.

The Vocational Committee organised one industry visit this year, were the members and their partners were guests of the management of Transurban City Link. After the inspection of their works the members and partners met at the Rising Sun Hotel in South Melbourne were a great night of fellowship took place.

I would like to express my gratitude and thanks to all the Committee Members for their dedication to the Vocational Projects and Programs.

experience and wisdom and I thank them for their contribution. Our committee also had the benefit of a number of new club members. Each new member made certain they became fully informed and we benefited by their fresh approach and innovative ideas.

The projects undertaken concentrated on providing a substantial sum to a smaller number of projects to ensure that the Club's funds were applied where the need was greatest and the benefits substantial. In light of these desires, I list below our Club's projects.

Finally, I would like to thank the Board for its generous support to what I believe in each case was a worthy recipient of the funds which were hard earned by each member of our Club.

Project:

International House:

This year we continued a long tradition of our Club in supporting International House. Following a Club visit to International House it became apparent that they were in need of an upgrade of the public address system. Many years ago the existing system had been donated by our Club but unfortunately was no longer suitable for the House. \$7,500 was provided as a contribution to the upgrade. This year again our Club was represented at their Café International where those members attending could see our new P.A. system put to full use.

Fish Farming:

\$3,000 was forwarded to East Timor to purchase and sustain broad stock for two farms in East Timor. It is hoped that from each of those farms will grow commercial fish stocks. Prior to the war in East Timor there were many of these farms but most, if not all, were destroyed by the war that thoroughly devastated the country. Its infrastructure was destroyed and they are re-building from almost bare land.

East Timor Orphanage:

With the problems of East Timor, District 9800 has adopted an orphanage. At the time of our first donation of \$5,000 there were 30 children in one room. Approval has also been given to forward any unspent balance of our budget to this project. This orphanage will be able to house many times the number of children presently there and will be looked after by local nuns.

Donations in Kind:

Not only were working bees conducted to assist in sorting and packing the goods for transport, Jane Bentley made several visits and a considerable contribution to this wonderful project.

Sporting equipment is in seriously short supply in East Timor. A new project has been initiated where tennis equipment is being forwarded to DIK. Approximately 75 racquets and 1,550 balls have been forwarded to date. There is a promise for lots more in the future.

ROTARY FOUNDATION:

Little needs to be said about this arm of Rotary which has done so much good work

throughout the world. It has become the international public face of Rotary. \$7,500

was donated to the foundation, representing \$100 per member, in order to aid its

great programs.

SAW MILL PROJECT:

\$6,000 has been allocated to the provision of a portable saw mill for Madang This

project will not proceed until the next Rotary year. We, together with other Rotary

clubs, are awaiting approval for a matching grant. Malcolm Munro did our Club a

great honour when he made a presentation of this project at the District Conference.

His presentation was very well received.

Committee Meetings

Regular committee meetings were held and all members were actively involved in the various projects outlined below.

Key Projects

Foodbank Food Preparation Room Refurbishment

Whilst this project was initiated by the previous Committee, it was successfully completed towards the end of last year. Due to the tremendous efforts of a number of Club members and the contractors engaged on the project, the final cost was significantly below the budget amount. The food preparation area is now adequately fitted to meet industry regulations and is a bright and welcoming area in which the Foodbank volunteers do the majority of their re-packaging. The Board approved the use of these surplus funds on other Foodbank related projects.

Foodbank Rice Project

The Committee's major initiative this year has been the development of a new project addressing a fundamental need of Foodbank. By its very nature, Foodbank relies on donations of damaged, incorrectly labelled or near use-by-date food items and thus does not have a constant supply of food items in stock. The only constant supply of food has been the results of the SPC Share-a-Can program. Foodbank ideally wanted to provide the 230 welfare agencies that use Foodbank with a constant supply of basic staple food items. Building on the Pasta Project from the previous year, the Club looked at the possibility of providing a constant supply of rice. Λ trial shipment of 3 tonnes was delivered in April and was an outstanding success with the welfare agencies who provide over 40,000 meals a week using Foodbank. The RC of Keilor has joined the project and 3 tonne lots of rice have been ordered for the months of May, June and July. The project has Board approval to use the remaining funds from the Food Preparation Room Refurbishment, with the ultimate aim of making this a sustainable year-round project both here in Melbourne and nationally through the other 6 Foodbanks.

Camcare Telephone System Upgrade

The Club has assisted Camcare with the upgrade of the telephone system at their Fairholm Grove offices. The old telephone system was unreliable, relied on volunteer operators to transfer calls internally or to take messages and could not access modern digital auto attendant phone menus. Over 30,000 telephone calls a year are made to Camcare requesting their services. The replacement telephone system will have multiple line capability and will allow direct dialling of extensions, voice mail capability and eventually a link to the Ashburton office. The new phone system will greatly assist Camcare in the delivery of their community services to the City of Boroondara.

Rotary Liver Cell Bank

The Club has supported this combined RC of Footscray and RC of Brunswick initiative with the purchase of a micro-centrifuge for this ground-breaking project. The Murdoch Children's Research Institute has developed a method whereby healthy human liver cells can be transfused into diseased livers to rejuvenate the organ. The day procedure would replace a liver transplant and only blood group typing is required. The Liver Cell Bank will bank cells and hold them on call for the purpose of live liver cell transplantation in Australia and the S.E. Asian region.

Boroondara Family Network

This is a local community program that trains volunteers to provide support for new mothers who are without the support normally provided by family and close friends. The senior nurse who is employed by the Network has trained over 30 volunteers. Referrals to the service typically come through the Maternal Health Care Centres. The Club made a donation towards the operating costs for the first year of this project.

Rotary Camp Getaway

A donation was made towards this District project which will see the Axedale camp converted into a modern camp catering specifically for the disabled and their carers. The Club also took part in a working bee to help progress the construction of the first four bed unit.

Business of Winning Luncheon

Once again, the efforts of a number of dedicated Rotarians and their partner Expo-Hire resulted in a very successful luncheon that raised a substantial sum for Myeloma Victoria.

Other Projects

The Committee was involved with a number of other projects during the year. The Club continued its involvement in the Boroondara Men's Health seminar series. Financial assistance was provided to the Canterbury Road House Community Care Unit to assist the recovery of their clients (who suffer from mental illness) through a self-confidence building camp at Wilson's Promontory. Donations were made to the Bone Marrow Donor Institute Cord Blood Bank, the Australian Kidney Foundation Renal Community Service program and to MedicAlert. Club members were also made aware of the reasons why individuals should consider organ donation. The Committee attempted a different method of selling Rotary Christmas cakes and puddings through the Camcare Christmas shop, however this was partially successful. The funds raised were directed back to Camcare's In-Home Family Support program. A donation was also made to the City of Boroondara Christmas Hamper Appeal. Prague House received assistance towards the expansion of their facilities and the Uniting Care Lodge Program was assisted with the repair of a pianola used by dementia patients. One last project that commenced close to the end of the Rotary year was the Toy Project. A supplier of unpainted wooden toy kits was found and Camberwell High was approached to see if they would be interested in assembling and painting them. The response from Camberwell High was very positive and year seven students will shortly be receiving the first batch of toys. We look forward to seeing how this project progresses over the next couple of months.

Hands-On Projects

The Rotary year commenced with a collection for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation at the Tooronga Village Coles supermarket. A small band of hard working volunteers joined North Balwyn in clearing the gardens at Eva Tilley. Another group cooked up a storm at the Spring Planting Festival at Bollin Bollin Reserve and fed over 70 community volunteers. Once again, a large contingent attended the Variety Club Children's Christmas party (some reportedly dressed as elves!). More recently, a number of "skilled tradespeople" spent a weekend at Rotary Camp Getaway doing roofing, plastering, wall cladding, pot-hole repairing, tree-felling and bonfire lighting. The year rounded out with three Club members assisting the Salvation Army for the Red Shield Appeal, and the Club once again collecting for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation at the Tooronga Village Coles supermarket.

A big thank you to all Club members and partners who assisted with these hands-on projects.

Summary

The Community Service Committee once again had a solid year. The Foodbank Rice Project is a very exciting project addressing a real need that will hopefully grow into a sound annual program supported by other Clubs and potentially the rice growing industry. We will continue to give any assistance requested by the incoming Committee to progress this project. Given the wide range of projects undertaken this year, there is no doubt that the incoming Committee, under Ron Lear's guidance, will have a wealth of community projects to tackle next year.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to the members of the Committee, many of them relatively new to the Club, for their efforts and enthusiasm in making this a successful year. I would also like to thank my deputy, Don, for his guidance and support throughout the year.

The 2001 Herald Sun - Camberwell Rotary Art Show marked the Club's 38th Show. The Show coincided with 'Centenary of Federation' Celebrations, which highlighted and embraced a number of new features. The venue was the Camberwell Centre. The dates 28th April to 4th May. The Show claimed a number of new records which included highest value prize pool, gross painting sales, individual painting sales, patron attendance and publicity.

Pre-Show Planning

The Vision 2001 Sub-Committee commenced planning this Show in 1999. The task of this Committee was to develop the Show's relationship with noted Royal artist Richard Stone and noted Australian diva, Dame Joan Sutherland AO AC DBE. The Committee coordinated the commission of a Dame Joan portrait and a limited edition print exercise. The exercise also included bringing Richard Stone to Melbourne for the Show.

This year also saw the appointment of a new Sub-Committee, Personal Management, under the stewardship of Bob Moran.

The Art Show Executive and the Vision Committee conjoined planning from July 2000. The combined efforts of both committees culminated in one of the best Show's ever!

Artist Entries

The main mail out to 6,000 artists occurred in mid-December. A second mail out followed in March. Publicity in the Australian Artist, Herald Sun and Progress Press helped bring the Art Show message to artists and the general public. Artists submitted 3,160 entries, which was down 5% on the previous year. A group of 12 works from the International Arts Council of Japan continued the cultural exchange between both countries.

Judging Panels

This year saw the appointment of two panels. The main panel consisted of Richard Stone [Chair], Gillian Faye Peebles [Perth, WA] and Paul McDonald Smith [Vic. Arts Society]. With the re-introduction of the Overseas Travel Grant a second panel consisted of Peter Anderson [Chair], artists, David Taylor, Maxwell Wilks and Club members Malcolm Munro and Dino Consalvo. Both panels acquitted themselves in a very professional manner.

Getting the Show Ready

Spotless Ltd. kindly permitted the Club to use the Parkview theatre on Wednesday 18th April. This enabled an early start to the freight operation and installation of the computer network

Publicity

Through the efforts of Peter Allen, David Baker and our Publicist Gerry Devine, a well-planned Show publicity campaign was prepared. Their groundwork culminated in the 'best ever' show coverage. A new style TV commercial complemented maximum TV exposure at peak times, which helped bring the show message to the public. Feature articles in the Herald Sun also helped the publicity exercise.

Sponsorship

Geoff Heath devoted an enormous amount of time procuring sponsors for the Show. This year the Committee engaged Consultant's to assist, unfortunately, with minimal result.

Receipt of Paintings

This important phase was under less 'pressure' this year when artists avoided the mid-Friday peak time. Affixing new catalogue number mountings and identifying Travel Grant entrants was done while artists waited in the computer check-in queue. Checking and identifying each painting is a tedious and an exacting task. All entries must be correctly recorded in the computer data bank.

Presentation and Judging

Initial grading of works followed receipt. This year the size of the panel was reduced to create greater efficiency. Initial grading resulted in slightly more than 1740 works being selected for exhibition. By the end of the Show this figure increased to over 1800 compared with 2060 last year. Segregation of 440 Travel Grant works expanded this operation. The Overseas Travel Grant panel convened late on Saturday to grade entries in this division.

Setting Up the Exhibition

ExpoHire creeted stands late on Saturday and continued through the night. With stands in place, Denise Oppy and her group of ladies had an early start on Sunday with panel selection. This operation proceeded according to plan. Limited hanging started later in the day. The whole show was in place by Tuesday evening.

The main judging panel convened on Wednesday 25th April and completed their deliberations the next day. The Overseas Travel Grant Award panel met on late on Friday 27th April to interview seven finalists

Launch Function

This year the traditional Preview Dinner made way for a Cocktail Launch function. This was preceded by a VIP Cocktail function in the Boroondara Room - for invited guests and sponsors. Over 300 guests attended the main function where President Jim Forrest welcomed guests. Richard Stone gave a brief report on the Show and announced principal winners.

Open to the Public

A 'traditional' Saturday queue formed prior to the opening of the doors at 10 am. A steady stream of patrons and sales followed. This was repeated on Sunday. Attendance on these days was up sharply and tested the resolve of staff. Attendance for the rest of the week was also up.

New Features

Features of the Show included:

- Dame Joan Sutherland portrait and Limited Edition Prints
- · Working portrait of Queen Elizabeth II canvas by Richard Stone
- Overseas Travel Grant
- Artist's Day on 30th April
- Student's Day on 2nd May

Presentation of Awards

This segment moved to Monday evening. This was done to coincide with the Artist's Day. Mr Julian Clarke, Managing Director of the Herald & Weekly Times Limited, presented the 'Best of Show' Award and Gold Medal to Joseph Zbubvic. Josh Fennell was awarded the Overseas Travel Grant Award. Twenty-three other awards were presented. At the close of the ceremony winners and their families were invited to the Boroondara Room for refreshments.

Closing the Show

The closing phase of the Show takes a lot of preparation. Peter Hancock and John Steven took two days to prepare the storage area. The closure of the Parkview display heralded the total closure at 6pm. ExpoHire staff helped clear the Parkview. Show helpers arrived at 6.30 pm to systemically remove works and store them. The Committee acknowledges the assistance of many people including students from Camberwell Grammar Boys School.

Return of Works

This segment heralds the completion of the Show. Many artists and purchasers attended to collect their works. The Freight Department prepared and dispatched 500 works. Only 17 works had to be taken to off-site storage. Damage to paintings was a serious downside of the Show. This caused embarrassment, delays and cost the Show money.

Summary

The overall result reflected:

- Gross painting sales up by 22% on 2000
- Individual painting sales were up 81to 660
- Patrons attendance was up 38% to 12,000
- · Raffle sales marginally lower

Show Result

Unfortunately at the time of preparing this report the final financial result was not to hand.

Looking to the Future

An Art Show Forum was held on 23rd May where lively constructive comments flowed. Another aspect of the Show is yet to happen. This is the Dame Joan Sutherland Luncheon on 24th July targeted to promote sales of the limited edition prints. Two Sub-Committees are currently planning the event and is a joint event with Opera Australia.

Retirement

Bob Moran has advised he is to retire from Rotary. I would like to thank Bob for his efforts to bring a new perspective to the Roster. I would also like to record Bob's many efforts within the Club and more specifically as Chairman of Photographic Show between 1992 to 1994.
