ART SHOW BRIEFING

Approx 70 members ,partners ,friends including four members from RC of Glen Eira attended the 2010 Art Show Briefing in the Medallion Room adjacent to The Heath Function Centre, Caulfield Racecourse.

Following the briefing, members moved to the Tabaret , private dining area for dinner and fellowship .

At the briefing, members were alerted to key changes to the Art Show this year in comparison to prior years .



The Key differences are

1. Short duration of the Show -8days verses 16days in past – impact on planning and roster
2. Exciting new venue with much more space –Have received some 2700 paintings verses 1680 paintings hung last year .
3. Website registration –some 60 % via website .New Technology with touch screens at entrance.
4. Marketing awareness –Traditional patrons plus new markets –have sent approx 3000 invitations
5. Team Concept /Roster grouping by function

The Team Leaders then provided a brief on the key features applicable to their Team activities .The six teams are -

A - Electronics &Transaction

B - Art Work &Artists

C - Infrastructure

D –Exhibition

E - Security &Marshalling

F - Accounting

G – Marketing &Sales



Members have been allocated to these teams and will be identified on the final Staff roster which will be circulated in the next week

Full details of the Presentations including building layout ,which members should review and be aware of the key locations, will be forwarded in a PDF format together with a detailed Operations Manual.

This Month's Theme—Australian Rotary Health

Australian Rotary Health's primary mission is to fund medical research by Australians, for Australians. Those research projects that are eligible for funding are selected by an honorary Research Committee, comprising eminent medical professionals from around Australia. ARH has now allocated over \$20 million in grants to Australian researchers with the major focus of this research currently on Mental Illness but other areas supported have included:

- Cancer research (bowel, prostate, breast and pancreatic)
- • Multiple Sclerosis
- • Motor Neurone disease: organ transplants: leukaemia and many others.

This year ARH endowed 10 pilot research studies under the new initiative Mental Health of Young Australians (Birth to 17 Years). The project is the first of its kind in Australia with over \$300,000 being spent on funding the pilot research projects. This research is a valuable investment in the health of Australian children.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

Australian Rotary Health began with one objective to provide funds for research into Cot Death. After the initial funds were provided for Cot Death research, the additional spending was directed towards other areas of health which impact significantly on the community. By having research projects that contain a strong element of applied research, it is possible to bring about practical strategies to enhance community health in a way that allows individual Rotarians and Rotary Clubs to see the benefits applied in their own communities.

PROGRAMS OF AUSTRALIAN ROTARY HEALTH

- **Mental Illness Research Projects - Grants** - Provides research grants for up to 3 years per project
- **Mental Illness Research PhD - Scholarships**—Provide financial support to PhD students
- **Mental Illness Post Doctoral - Fellowships**—Will be provided to early career researchers in the area on mental illness.
- **Evaluation of Mental Health Services— Research Project Grants**—This funding aims to improve local mental health services by providing grants to evaluate current programs.
- **Evaluation of Rural Health Services – Research Grants**—Funding will support research projects that have the potential to restore or promote the health of Australians living in rural and / or remote areas.
- **Indigenous Health Scholarships.**—This program assists Indigenous Australians who are undertaking a health related university course.
- **Scholarships for Nursing** - Rural Nursing Scholarships provide an incentive for nursing students to complete their third year major clinical placement and graduating year in a rural or remote area.
- **Funding Partners – Research in all Health Areas - PhD Scholarships**—ARH Funding Partners program helps to provide funds for medical research in areas other than mental illness. If a Rotary club wants to provide a grant for a particular area of research for instance heart disease, ARH will also contribute and arrange contributions from the scholar's university.

HOW CAN YOU PARTICIPATE IN THIS RESEARCH?

Rotary Clubs are invited to form a partnership with Australian Rotary Health (ARH) to jointly fund a research project grant or a research scholarship in an area of health that is not the current focus for the fund.

For instance, a Rotary Club or Cluster can join a University and ARH to jointly fund a PhD Scholarship. Also Clubs and individuals can make a contribution to ARH by becoming a "Friend" or "Companion" of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund (ARHRF). Donations over \$2 are tax deductible.

Australian Rotary Health has a broad vision of health. They are a catalyst for projects that improve the quality of life for people who are least able to assist themselves. The research that they support saves lives, transforms communities and improves the quality of life for Australians .
